"A SORT OF BLOOM.....by Shiona Clark, The Irish Terrier Association News Bulletin, 1980 (England) via The Daredevil Messenger

I've been thinking lately and wondering just what it is about these Irish mutts of ours that keeps us so hooked on them that we keep coming back for more.

Oh, I know, you can list all their advantages from their size (small enough to pick up; big enough to guard) to how good they are with children to their adaptability and so on. But, let's be honest. Morris Animal Foundation Release

Gastric dilatation-volvulus, or bloat, is one of the most devastating and feared diseases of dog owners and breeders.

Bloat is a severe, often fatal, gastrointestinal disease. Bloast strikes suddenly, most often in large breed, deep chested dogs, and causes the dog's stomach to twist under the pressure of trapped gas. Dogs may suffer repeated bloat attacks, and immediate veterinary attention is needed to save the dog's life. Even with prompt medical help, many survive bloat surgery only to die shortly afterwards or within the next 72 hours.

Why so many dogs fall victim to bloat after successful surgery is mysterious, but several theories exist. One theory receiving attention from veterinary scientists is that while dogs may survive bloat surgery, they later die from shock caused by irregular beating of the heart. These abnormal heart rhythms, which have been found in affected dogs before and after bloat surgery, can cause the heart to stop.

What's more, drugs traditionally used to control abnormal heart beating or rhythm are often ineffective in bloat cases.

To learn more about this serious heart problem, Morris Animal Foundation has sponsored a study at the Ohio State University under investigators, John D. Bonaura, D.V.M. and William W. Muir, D.V.M., Ph.D

The specific heart problem associated with bloat are ventricular arrhythmias, Dr. Bonagura reports. Blood is pumped through the circulation system by muscular heart cavities called ventricles. Ventricular arrhythmias cause these muscles to contract irregulary and either too fast or too slow to effectively pump the blood.

Besides exploring the cause of the heart problem, Dr. Bonagura's team also plans to examine several drugs used for treating the abnormal heart rhythms.

Farewell

The Honey household, at present, is so calm and relaxed that it is hardly interesting. From the first day of this change, I have remarked, "How I miss that laugh a day."

The reason for this change is that we no longer have Mex. Ch. Kilvara O'Cally of Rockledge. Three months before her 14th birthday she decided it was time. She slipped away, happy and contented to the end.

She was certainly her own personality. I am sitting here looking at a picture I took of her very recently and it is so typical. Her tongue is hanging out with almost a half grin on her face. One ear is standing straight up. The other ear is folded over but pointing out to the side of her head. She was always so happy and had the air about her that said, "I am so beautiful." Maybe that is why no one could resist laughing with her. She rarely came in from outside without a leaf or stick hanging from her chin. Barbara always lovingly called her "Pigpen."

Memories

At a time like this, one becomes very reflective. Cally was bred by Jerry O'Callaghan. She was whelped in Boston on the same day we broke ground for our present home in California. She was raised for Jerry in the home of Paul and Mary Welch. They called her "Beanie" and I often thought it was a very appropriate name for her.

It was at Montgomery, the fall before, that Martha Hall promised me that she would see that I got a good bitch. Cruse agreed that this sounded like the way we should go. When in July, Jerry wrote to me that he thought he had a nice bitch for me but would like to watch her for awhile longer, I did not bring it up at home.

Building a house while trying to sell another one does not mean a great deal of extra money available. I decided that after we sold our house there would be plenty of time to tell Cruse we would probably be getting a new puppy.

We had been in our new house barely a week and the other house was still unsold. A letter arrived from Jerry advice it proved to be the right one.

Fortunately, we did listen to the sage advice of these two people and with their guidance eventually brought in two stud dogs to round out our program.

Daculte

While I have been sitting here writing and reminiscing I just received a call from the Feb. I. T. C. A. Specialty in New York. A grandson of Cally's had just retired the "Martha Hall Trophy." This meant that the trophy had been won three times by the same owner and in this case it had been won by the same dog as Best of Breed.

Tribute

There is no personal triumph meant in all of this. It is, rather, a tribute to dedicated breeders of the past. To name just a few: Jerry O'Callaghan, Martha Hall, General McKinley, and Dr. Leonard Goss, Sr.. Their kennel prefixes appear in almost every American Bred Irish Terrier around today.

Lessons To Learn

From my own experiences I want to say something to the breeders who are just starting out. You are the hope for the future of this lovely breed. Take your time before you purchase the bitch you intend to breed. Attend as many shows as possible, visit with the exhibitors and breeders at ringside, and by all means read and reread your Irish Terrier standard. Study it until you feel you can do your own judging at ringside. When you have confirmed in your mind, the type of bitch that best exemplifies what you have learned, look at pedigrees. Most breeders are happy to supply pedigrees for those interested.

I can't stress enough, the value of pedigrees. I am totally in favor of line breeding. Everyone does not interpret the standard exactly the same. No dog will be perfect and each person has his/her preference as to the most important part of the standard. Whatever, it must add up to the overall dog reflecting the standard.

Read the standard for the undesirable qualities and check to be sure they are not present in your chosen bitches line as far as you can check. The breeder who is improved the property of the chosen and the standard for the present injustice to the

simply stating the puppy would be arriving the next day. Panic! Ostrich-like, I just put the letter on Cruse's desk where he would see it when he came home. I quietly went about my work wondering what the reaction would be. For over 40 years Cruse has been able to surprise me. He just walked back into the kitchen and calmly said, "Well, I guess you have a trip into Los Angeles tomorrow."

What dreams of glory I had as I drove into L. A., the next day. When I took Cally out of the crate at the airport I was greeted by that original smirk of hers. Her ears had been glued (for the first time) and she looked very nice. When the ears finally came loose - one stood straight up and the other ear folded to the side of her head. No matter how we worked on them they never changed. The show ring bored her utterly and I had to reluctantly realize she was never going to be a show dog.

I have to admit it was all very disappointing to me but then I realized that I had to have faith that Jerry O'Callaghan was first - a breeder. I am sure that those who knew him well would agree that for him, breeding came before winning in the ring. He had the eye to go through a litter and say, "Breed that one. Show that one." I am sure some of the decisions were baffling to the litter owner. If he/she was wise enough to take his

breed. I have always proudly stated that it is because the Irish Terrier breeders are honestly concerned, that our breed is relatively free of physical and temperament

So, to you new breeders, I say, find the best bitch you can but then don't give up if she does not become a great show dog. If she is well bred and in return bred to a strong stud dog in her line you will be fine.

When you can look at one of your litters and they look like "peas in a pod" and just like your last litter that turned out so well; when you and another breeder, breeding in the same line have litters the same age and you know you would never dare put both litters in the same pen for fear you would never find your own, then you are doing successful line breeding.

Two Approaches

The novice looks at the Best of Breed and Best of Or posite Sex from two opposite blood lines and remarks, "I want the top bitch from a beeding of those two." The chances of this novice getting an outstanding puppy from this breeding is very slim.

The experienced breeder can make the same statement. He/she does not expect anything superior from the breeding. The experienced breeder plans to take the top bitch from the breeding and in turn breed it back closely to the better parent. This may have to be continued for several generations before the really fine puppy appears.

The breeder who flits here and there, breeding to one winner after another may come up with a "flyer" occa-

sionally but never consistence.

This has all been a bit rambling but there are so many thoughts and emotions that surface at times like this. I want so much to impress the next generation of breeders to approach all of this slowly, seriously, and certainly with patience.

By the time you are reading this and I am sure some will be forming your disagreements with me, I will be making a fast trip to Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and England. I am sure I will bring back a bit of the "auld sod" to sprinkle over the area that contains the ashes of our past "Irish Americans."
