



## SPECIALTY RESULTS

JUDGE'S CRITIQUE--National Specialty in New York, Feb. 1983

It was a great pleasure judging the Specialty of the Irish Terrier Club of America on Feb. 13, 1983 at the Donn Center. The judging was delayed for two hours due to a blizzard, but believe it or not the majority of entries were present. It shows that Dog Show Exhibitors are a very hardy lot.

Winner dog and Best of Winners went to a young dog almost 14 months, Rockledge Doctor Caius, owned by Dr. Andrew T. Nadell and Dr. Karen Johnson, a very upstanding dog, very sound, a bit larger than I prefer but an easy winner. 2nd in open was Glenworth's Macho Man, owned by Mr. & Mrs. Edward F. Worth, a nice dog but certainly not showing at his best so he was beaten by the puppy dog, Blackacre Briargate, owned by John Best, nice outline, good coat.

Bitches were a bit of a disapointment in general, there were several nice coated, good showing bitches but they were out classed by Sally Critchlow's Rockledge Encore O' Aberdovey, a litter sister to the Winners dog, a nice headed bitch, full of quality who went on to Best of Opposite Sex over 3 bitch Specials on her excellent type and soundness.

The Specials class was a really find class. There were at least 3 Best In Show winners, all from different areas of the country and they could easily change places at any time, but on the day, I thought that Linda Honey's Ch. Rockledge's Mick Michael just was a bit better in neck and shoulders. There were also several other group winners that are excellent Irish Terriers. I do not know anyother terrier breed being shown that has the depth of quality that was shown in the Irish Terriers today.

It was interesting to see afterwards that my Best of Breed was the brother of he Winners Dog and Winners bitch, plus the sire of some other fine dogs and the brother to another Best In Show winner.


Thank you for the pleasure of judging such a lovely group of dogs, I did enjoy my day.


SHOW GROOMING THE IRISH TERRIER, by Ellis West


STEP #1. It usually takes 12 weeks for your Irish to reach full coat, the first section of the coat should be stripped 12 weeks before your "big show". Start about two finger widths behind the top of the shoulder blades. Pull all the long coat right down to the soft undercoat. The back, sides, the stomach and shaded part of the hind-quarters should all be stripped in the first step.

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


STEP #2. There should now be a semi-circle of long hair from the withers and shoulders toward the head. Wait 4 days after the inital stripping and take off two finger width strip around the back of the neck. Continue every four days taking off another strip from one side ruff to the other. When you reach the base of the skull, STOP.










SHOW GROOMING THE IRISH TERRIER, continued

STEP #6. Seven weeks before the show, strip the throat, the underneck, the chest and the ruff to the skin. Lighly re-strip uneven hairs on back and neck.





STEP #7. Six weeks before the show strip the top of the skull from the outside corner of the eye straight back to where the ear is fastened atop the skull and take from the back of the skull to the neck.



STEP #8. Four weeks before the show strip the sides of the skull, from the outside corner of the eye to the corner of the mouth, under the chin, and the cheeks. Strip ears.

# THE FURNISHINGS, by Edna Sillavan

When you speak of furnishings on the Irish Terrier you are referring to the hair on his front and back legs and also his mustache. Special care must be given to furnishings on the Irish who is to be shown. My technique is this:

1. Wash weekly with soft soap and cream rinse.

2. Dailey brushing and oiling. Before brushing the furnishings, spray lighly with water and apply a man's hair dressing such as Vita Point. Heavier oils can be used on outside dogs.


3. Stripping out straggle hairs every three weeks. This keeps the furnishings

uniform and deeper in color.

4. Lightly pull the hair from between the eyes to give a sharper outline and to separate the eye brow. Never pull the hair underneath the eyes.

5. Lightly strip the top of the muzzel and around the nose.







THE FINISHING TOUCH, by Edna SILLAVAN(with the help of every professional I ever spied on)

3 WEEKS and counting----Repeat Steps 1 through 5, lightly stripping the longer and straggle hairs from the coat. Care should be given at this point not to strip too deeply so as not to pull a hole in the coat.

Repeat Steps 6 (omit pulling tail again) and 8. Pulling close again.

- 2 WEEKS and counting----Relax
- 1 WEEK and counting-----Clipper belly.

Trim the hair around the feet neatly. Clipper the hair off the pads of the feet. Cut toenails short. Nails should be cut every week to keep short.

Comb your Irish just as you would to put him into the ring. Now start at the head-Check to make sure his eye brows are correct, his beard neat, cheeks clean, ears neat and clean on the inside, his teeth clean, Now check the neck and front. The hair should be very short and smooth. Next his side, the ruff should be smooth and flat, if not so, thinning shears can be used to correct this. Shoulder hair should be very short and smooth, blending the hair lengths evenly into the leg. Under the stomach, taper chest hair into the clean belly. Trim the hair on the tuck-up evenly, using scissors or the stripping knife. Around to the rear, the hair here should be very close and laying flat. Thinning shears can be used here carefully to do this. Hair from hock to feet should be pulled even. Hair should lay close to leg to accent the stifle. Now the other side.

Put the show lead on and have someone walk your Irish out and back. Now have him show stacked for you. This is what the judge will see next week, so now's the time to make any corrections. . Sometimes it is necessary to lighly pull the hair across the shoulder and over the back to get a smoother top-line. You'll find that the hair grows faster and thicker at different places on your dog.

- 24 HOURS and counting----Wash all the furnishing with a hard soap (no cream rinse).

  Blow dry, brushing the hair first up, then down. With dry towel, wipe the rest of his coat clean.
- 30 MINUTES and counting--With dry towel, wipe the dog down. Brush the dog from top
  to bottom, from end to end. Take a small amount of Kolestral
  and rub it smooth in the palm of your hands. Press your coated
  hands into the furishing of the dog. Then with a wire palm brush,
  brush the furishing on the legs up and out. Then comb the hair
  down. Do the same with the whiskers. Spray lighly the back
  and sides of the dog with Mink Oil and brush the coat with a
  horse-hair glove until he shines.

# RUSTY—THE STORY OF A DOG'S LIFE

Editor's Note: The following letter, received recently by the club secretary, portrays so accurately and sympathetically the characteristics found in many Irish Terriers that it is given a place in this volume.

Dear Mr. Rice:

Rusty is dead. To you and to those families who like us have been foster parents to Sanka's breed this means the end of an era, for Dr. Hopkins tells me that Rusty was the last immediate surviving kin of Sanka. As you know, Rusty was no show dog. He never won a ribbon. He never even entered a show. He was too large for an Irish Terrier, and one of his ears wouldn't do the things a show dog's ears should do. When he was a puppy you told us that adhesive tape and persistence might help but Daughter Ellen wouldn't hear of it. To her Rusty was and always remained perfect. So he went through life with one ear up and one ear back, taking it from all sides, as it were. He grew from playmate, to confidante, to counsellor and finally to overseer. For nearly seventeen years he made a daily circuit of the farm; lately with deliberation but no loss of acuity in spite of impaired sight and total loss of hearing. Like the mail man, he was expected and welcome at every stop.

Of course we have innumerable Rusty stories, such as the war-time steak story, when Rusty made off with our prize home-grown porterhouse steak which we had saved for Son John's furlough. I had buried the steak and a bottle of champagne in the remains of an old snowdrift outside the kitchen window. (The electric current had failed us that day.) Rusty's nose caked with dirt told me the story long before I would have discovered it otherwise. There are 500 acres of land on our farm, under any square foot of which that steak might have lain. But it was John's last night at home and the alternative of scrambled eggs was unthinkable. The steak had to be found.

So, being in great trouble and as wives are wont to do, I called Ellsworth. Together we importuned Rusty, and Ellsworth promised him half the steak if he would show us where it was buried. With just the barest trace of reluctance Rusty stood up, shook himself and started slowly across the lawn, Ellsworth and I following gingerly lest we distract his attention from the business ahead. Rusty walked very straight and a little stiffly, with an odd, self-conscious stringency in his hind legs and tail. He led us down the hill, up the farm road, through the bars, across the hard frozen pasture and into the woods west of the upper spring. For nearly a mile he walked silently, stiffly, while we rather foolishly followed. Then he circled slowly around and backtracked almost to the house.

At this point Ellsworth lost faith and set off for the cow-barn. Rusty and I were alone. It was getting dark, and John would be coming in for dinner any moment now. Suddenly Rusty's nose went up! He drew in one long, delicious sniff and then, beckoning me to follow, he turned and leaped over the stonewall into a thicket. He shoved his nose under a large shelving stone where the ground was not frozen and carefully scratched the leaves and dirt to one side. Tenderly he pulled out the still frozen steak and dropped it on the ground between us. He watched me anxiously until I picked it up, and then with his tail wagging furiously and cavorting with jov, he headed for home. I scrubbed the good Vermont earth off the meat and broiled it over hot coals, and John and Rusty halved the steak. I don't think Rusty minded that half of his half was bone. As for the champagne, he overlooked that entirely.

I wondered then and I have wondered since whether Rusty knew all along where the steak lay, and was just taking us for a pleasant buggy-ride during that first circumambient tour, or whether he deliberately retraced the path he had taken when he buried it, or whether—but there is so much to wonder about in a dog's life.

Rusty never preached, he never punished, he never rammed his ideas down other people's throats, so people were at their best with him. All in all, I feel confident that for Rusty a "dog's life" was a good one

# SOMETHING OF INTEREST, continued

If you own an AKC registered dog or bitch which is not recorded in your name, we wish to point out that should they sire or whelp any litters, the certification of ownership on the litter registration application must be signed by the person who actually owns the dog or bitch. If this person is someone other than the recorded owner on our records, an application to transfer such ownership must be made before the litter can be registered. Application for transfer of ownership of a registered dog should be made on the reverse side of its registration certificate. This certificate with proper fee should then be sent to our office.

# Who Takes Care of the Actual Mating

The usual procedure is for the female to be sent to the male for mating - which is handled by the owner of the male unless he feels incapable of handling the matter and cares to engage a veterinarian or licensed handler to take care of it for him.

#### One or Two Services

Many people make it a practice of servicing a bitch twice with the same stud during a heat, with a day's interval, in an endeavor to be on the safe side. However, many others feel one service is sufficient providing it was done at the proper time and gave evidence of being a successful one.

### Frequency in Using a Dog or Bitch for Breeding

We are hesitant in answering questions regarding how often to use a dog for stud service. If the owner has the dog's welfare in mind and not how much he can get out of the dog, the bibliographical material enclosed includes information on this subject. Naturally the condition of the individual dog, his age, whether he is just being introduced to stud work, or is an established stud dog have a great deal of bearing in the particular case. For an established stud dog in his prime, we would say an average of once a week should not be harmful, and it would be wise for the dog's sake to give him at least a month's rest period now and then.

It is not considered good breeding practice to breed a female every time she comes in heat. Once a year is sufficient — or if she is a good healthy brood matron, she possibly could stand being bred two successive heats and then skip one. This practice seems to be the most satisfactory in the long run.

## Dogs Six Years of Age or Over

With regards to dogs six years of age or over, which have never as yet been used for breeding or not used fairly recently, we suggest the advice of a qualified veterinarian (one who specializes in dogs and other small animals) be sought before mating.

## "Registering Available Stud Dog in Stud Book"

If you are under the impression that our Stud Book Register is the proper publication in which to list a dog as being available at stud, we wish to point out that our monthly magazine, "Pure-Bred Dogs - American Kennel Gazette", is the source of information regarding available stud dogs - not our Stud Book Register.

The old practice of publishing the names of <u>all</u> AKC registered dogs was discontinued with the June 1952 issue of our Stud Book Register. Starting with the following issue, December 1952, we only publish in our Stud Book Register those dogs and bitches, not previously published. which have

ure on our part after their first litter has been registered with us. As heretofore, the addresses of owners and breeders are not published in the Stud Book Register. The Stud Book Register is a valuable aid in checking the pedigree of a dog - the Cazette is the means of finding stud dogs available for service.
